Hagar Singapore Ltd ("HAGAR") is a registered charity in Singapore and part of a global organisation dedicated to combating human trafficking and modern slavery.

Since 1994, HAGAR has assisted thousands of women and children on their paths to healing and empowerment after enduring human trafficking, slavery, and abuse. We strive daily to maximise our impact on personal, community, national, and global levels.

From the moment a survivor enters our care, we assess their needs, and offer personalised services to help them recover and thrive. These services may include providing a safe place to live, counselling, healthcare, family support, legal assistance, education, skills training, job placements, and help with community reintegration.



HAGAR runs Programme Offices in Afghanistan, Cambodia, Vietnam, and Singapore. In February 2023, we expanded further into Thailand.

We also work with partners in Myanmar and Solomon Islands, and have Support Offices in Australia, Hong Kong, New Zealand, Singapore, the UK, and the USA.

We pursue the highest degree of care and protection for our clients. While client images have been used throughout this report, these images do not necessarily represent the individuals profiled.

THANK YOU FROM OUR SINGAPORE LEADERS

In 2023, challenges persisted, with little relief from the COVID-19 pandemic. Soaring prices of energy, food, and essentials sparked a massive cost-of-living crisis.

Migrant workers in Singapore bore the brunt, facing escalating costs that outstripped their low wages, plunging them deeper into poverty and limiting access to food and healthcare. Economic hardships drove many to seek overseas job opportunities, risking their well-being to support their families.

During visits exploring reintegration for returning clients to Bangladesh, we found intense competition for jobs, allowing agents to exploit job seekers with exorbitant fees. Women, especially those lacking formal education, faced limited opportunities upon return. Unfortunately, similar resettlement challenges awaited all our women beneficiaries in Singapore.

Despite these difficulties, we have seen positive changes among survivors in Singapore, Cambodia, Vietnam, and Afghanistan, where our Singapore office supports survivors through HAGAR's programmes.

Before the year's end, we hosted our first alumni gathering in Cambodia, meeting nearly a hundred former Hagar beneficiaries. Hearing their stories firsthand, we commend our colleagues for their tireless efforts in uplifting and empowering these individuals. With the support of donors, partners, supporters, and volunteers, we've raised awareness and secured funds to rehabilitate and empower lives. As we navigate a world marked by geopolitical tensions, conflicts, and economic instability, impoverished communities suffer the most. International travel returning to pre-pandemic levels has seen a rise in crime, with syndicates exploiting new technologies for profit.

We hope you would continue to join us in restoring lives and offering hope to survivors of trafficking and exploitation. **Together, we can make a significant impact and strengthen systems to protect the vulnerable and marginalised.** Thank you for partnering with us!



HEALING STARTS WITH A Home of love

CAMBODIA

Down a narrow, potholed road on the outskirts of Phnom Penh, Cambodia, sits the Home of Love. It's not fancy, it doesn't need to be. Because, for the women and girls who find refuge here every year, this is where miracles begin.

The Home of Love opened in 2021 at the height of the Covid-19 pandemic. As neighbouring countries closed their borders, Cambodian women who had been working abroad were forced to return home. And come home they did, bearing the marks of trafficking, enslavement and abuse. But there was no place for the women to heal, grow in financial stability, or be supported to reintegrate into community. Riddled with the shame of failure and the physical and emotional scars of abuse, they were at risk for further exploitation.

When MOSAVY (Cambodia's Ministry of Social Affairs, Veterans, and Youth) asked if HAGAR could help these women, we agreed, and the Home of Love was born. The pandemic may be behind us, but trafficking to China is not.

A DESCRIPTION OF THE OWNER OF THE

The stories of women trafficked to China carry a thread of similarity. They come from impoverished Cambodian families and are lured with the promise of a good-paying job. Each woman believes with all her heart that this opportunity will help her family escape their devastating poverty. Some go willingly, the dream of creating a better life before them. Others are tricked, or horrifyingly, sold by their own family members. In the end, hundreds of them take the risky overland journey from Cambodia to China every year.

But what they find is rarely the golden story they were promised.

With no passport or identity documents, nor a valid visa to be working in the country, the women are at the mercy of their broker. When they are told they need a marriage certificate to qualify for a good job, they agree to marry a local man. More often than not, they're despised by their husband and his family, locked in the house, and cut off from the outside world. Many women are sexually assaulted – sometimes multiple times a day – with the hope they'll become pregnant with a son.

If they do finally escape to the local police, they are stripped of their savings and personal belongings and thrown in a detention centre for illegal immigrants.

When HAGAR gets the phone call from MOSAVY that a new group of women have been extradited from China, they race to the airport to meet them.

The women, some as young as 14 or 15, walk off the plane with nothing but the clothes on their backs and a haunted look in their eyes. They've endured so much. Their self-esteem is at an all-time low. Most are depressed and overcome with panic and sadness. Some are suicidal.

How do they walk through the trauma and get to the other side? How do they find hope for the future? How do they reclaim their dignity and value and rebuild their lives?

For HAGAR, the answer is love.

At the Home of Love, women who have experienced the unimaginable find a haven of freedom and warmth. It feels like family. The normalcy of daily routines – household chores, cooking and eating meals together - help each survivor regain equilibrium. The house mother treats each young woman like her own beloved daughter. These are the building blocks of restoration.

While this is happening, HAGAR's case work team kicks into action. They trace the women's families. They train parents and siblings and the wider community in traumainformed care. They teach trafficking prevention strategies, and help each woman's family to welcome her home with open arms. When a woman returns home, HAGAR's support continues. Each survivor, her family and her community continue to receive follow-up care until they are resilient.

"The family and community over time sustains the health and well-being of the client," says Sam Sreyna, Hagar Cambodia Country Director.

HAGAR's holistic approach at the Home of Love is mirrored across our global survivor care programmes. From Afghanistan's protection shelters to Vietnam's community-based restoration projects, HAGAR provides professional, individualised care that is underpinned by love.



Forging freedom in a high-conflict region

AFGHANISTAN

Every day, HAGAR's team in Afghanistan braves security risks, government-mandated restrictions, and intimidation and threats. Yet they prevail in their dedication to help survivors and advocate for change.

You enabled 1,396 women and children to be cared for, allowed the only girls' protection shelter in the country to run and equipped 300 community leaders to prevent exploitation.

Harnessing the power of survivor voice and social media to prevent exploitation

VIETNAM

HAGAR harnessed the power of people's stories and social media to spread awareness about violence and abuse. The public was invited to create prevention messages using their own stories for an online campaign. More than 200 messages were submitted and the campaign reached 253,541 people. By hearing real experiences and stories, the audience gained a deeper understanding of how people come to be exploited.

Preventing human trafficking among migrant workers

SINGAPORE

Partnering with the Singapore authorities, HAGAR interviewed women migrant workers in vulnerable industries. These screening interviews revealed the plights of exploited women. With HAGAR's help, the women received support and care, and employers violating laws were held accountable. Plans are underway to continue this successful partnership in 2024.

HAGAR reduces gender-based violence

MYANMAR

Through implementing partner, Yangon Kayin Baptist Women's Association (YKBWA), dozens of women were empowered with education on gender-based violence, child rights and managing stress and trauma.

Through peer-led groups and community-based training sessions, an estimated 600 individuals learned how to keep their families safe from abuse and exploitation.

80% of women participants said they felt more confident and safe in their closest relationships.

STRENGTHENING SYSTEMS

You helped HAGAR transform communities by investing in local leaders, partnering with governments, and equipping the nongovernment sector to protect those vulnerable to human trafficking, slavery, and abuse.

Minea spent time at HAGAR's Home of Love after being trafficked to China by her best friend. She chose to take legal action against her trafficker. In early 2023, Minea won her court case. Her trafficker was arrested and sentenced to seven years in prison.

"Now I fight for justice and to prevent other young women from becoming victims of human trafficking like me. Without HAGAR's support, I would not have been able to get justice and become the strong confident woman I am today. I have my life back and I have hope for my new life."

In February, HAGAR expanded into Thailand through a strategic integration with LIFT International.

For 12 years, LIFT has worked in Thailand building the capacity of law enforcement agencies in investigating human trafficking cases, prosecuting perpetrators and supporting survivors. Thousands of individuals have found freedom through justice with LIFT's assistance.

By joining forces, we extended Hagar's holistic survivor care to include multi-disciplinary investigation and prosecution.

This was evident in our work in Thailand; HAGAR continued to train staff in survivor care and exploitation prevention, while LIFT taught the team to run investigations and collaborate with law enforcement.



Building capability expands impact

SOLOMON ISLANDS

This year marked the halfway point of a five-year capacity building partnership with the Hope Trust.



• community-based Crime Prevention Committees launched to protect women and children from exploitation.

610 community leaders were trained to deliver trauma-informed care. Often the first place victims of trafficking and abuse go for support, these leaders are now able to provide psychological first aid and refer cases to Hope Trust's professional team.



Hope Trust joined the Solomon Islands' national referral system for abuse cases, enabling advocacy alongside other national organisations.

Partnering with the Bethesda (Bedok-Tampines) Church, members of the church from various age groups and backgrounds teamed up to organise a massive carnival fair for approximately 200 female migrant workers on 12 November 2023. The ladies enjoyed a day filled with fun, games, dance, and music, seizing the opportunity to unwind and socialise. *"We had so much fun, and it was nice to meet so many friends,"* one participant remarked.

Migrant Community Carnival

Many of these women migrant workers have experienced hardship, and some have suffered abuse, leading to emotional distress and anxiety. In addition to literacy and skills-building programmes aimed at helping them create a pathway out of poverty, HAGAR works with these women to help them build emotional resilience. The carnival exemplifies the regular social support activities that HAGAR runs to foster social integration, providing our migrant friends with opportunities to relax, connect mentally, and form healthy relationships within the wider local community.

> As evening approached, they were treated to their favourite fried chicken meal, followed by a session of singing and dancing. Some even took to the stage, dancing to songs in their native languages.

The night ended on a high note, with new friendships formed, heartfelt conversations, shared encouragement, and lots of laughter. As a keepsake, the women took home photographic prints from a photo booth set up at the carnival. Many tears were shed, and hugs exchanged as the migrant workers felt greatly encouraged by the support from the Singapore community. Our migrant friends expressed their happiness and gratitude for the time spent together and the new friendships formed.





The Singapore team included over 80 volunteers, with the youngest being 4 years old. They planned the games and activities, organised collection of pre-loved clothes and raised funds from within the church for the entire carnival. All set for the next event, church members are eagerly awaiting the chance to reunite with their newfound migrant friends. *"It was touching to see their gratitude for our support during the event. Working with migrant workers in my full-time job since 2019, I understand their ongoing struggles. Volunteering with my family, and teaching my son the value of helping others, made the experience even more meaningful.*

I want these women to know that our Lord loves them deeply and will guide them through their challenges. As a Singapore community, let's show more appreciation for their contributions and treat them fairly and respectfully."

tistics from recent years reveal that the number of enslaved individuals has surged from 40.3 million in 2022 to nearly 50 million, today.

To address the rising number of modern slavery victims, this year's annual 40.3 Freedom Race introduced the "+" edition, aiming to amplify awareness of the escalating situation and explore effective ways to alleviate the suffering of victims.

During the 40.3+ Freedom Race 2023, participants engaged in their chosen fitness challenge to raise funds for survivors of human trafficking and modern slavery, supported by HAGAR. Some participants took on additional challenges to boost their contributions, to support the growing number of victims.

For 10 days, from 4-13 November 2023, participants ran, cycled, swam, walked, golfed, and pushed themselves to call for financial support from their family and friends.





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In total, \$237,878 was raised from their private networks - These donations provided essential recovery care and economic empowerment to 3,171 survivors of trafficking and abuse. Donors also gained insights into human trafficking, its effects on victims, and HAGAR's efforts in supporting and rehabilitating survivors.

Escalating global challenges in the post-pandemic era have significantly heightened the susceptibility of vulnerable individuals to human trafficking, with the numbers continuing to rise.

Migrant workers constitute a substantial portion of those at highest risk of human trafficking. Despite their critical roles in sustaining societies and economies during the pandemic, migrants often lack adequate protection. Financial pressures and the struggle to make ends meet make them easy targets for criminal syndicates, particularly impoverished young women who are deceived with false promises of better opportunities overseas.

From Singapore, HAGAR will step up efforts with the Singapore Government's Inter-Agency Taskforce on Trafficking in Persons to provide input to investigation processes through screening interviews, and deliver recovery care and support services to victims.



Overall, donations decreased by approximately \$200,000 compared to the previous year. This decline resulted from the impact of the unstable economy on charitable contributions throughout the financial year. Expenses, on the other hand maintained at around the same level as compared to the previous year.

Corporate Governance

HAGAR's Board of Directors offer strategic direction and oversight of the organisation's programmes and objectives. They guide the charity in fulfilling its vision and mission through effective governance practices. As part of its role, the following matters require the Board's approval:

- Approve budget for the financial year and monitor expenditure against budget;
- Review and approve quarterly financial statements;
- Regularly monitor the progress of the charity's programmes

To enable succession planning and steady renewal of the charity, the Board has a term limit of nine years.

CODE OF GOVERNANCE

HAGAR is committed to and adheres to the Code of Governance for Charities issued by the Charity Council.

RESERVES POLICY

HAGAR has a reserve policy for long-term stability of the operations and it ensures that there are sufficient resources to support the charity in the event of unforeseen circumstances. As a general rule of thumb, HAGAR targets to have at least 3-6 months of operational expenditure kept as reserves. The reserve level is reviewed yearly by the Board to ensure that the reserves are adequate to fulfil the charity's continuing obligations.

The reserves that have been set aside provide financial stability and the means for the development of the charity's principal activity. HAGAR intends to maintain its reserves at a level that is capped at a maximum of 6 months of operational expenditure. The charity intends to use the reserves to sustain the following activities in the event of an economic crisis where HAGAR's ability to receive funds is severely hampered:

(a) Programmes and services to beneficiaries in Singapore and;
(b) Commitments to global programmes for suvivors of trafficking and abuse in Cambodia, Vietnam and Afghanistan, and;
(c) Pupping of the HACAP office to provide uninterrupted delivery of

(c) Running of the HAGAR office to provide uninterrupted delivery of

services and programmes for stakeholders and beneficiaries.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY

All Board members and staff are required to comply with the charity's conflict of interest policy. The Board has put in place documented procedures for Board members and staff to declare actual or potential conflicts of interests on a regular and need-to basis.

WHISTLE-BLOWING POLICY

HAGAR has in place, a whistle-blowing policy to address concerns about possible wrongdoing or improprieties in financial or other matters within the charity.

REMUNERATION DECLARATION

Two of the charity's staff received more than \$100,000 in annual remuneration each.

HAGAR's main source of financial support are donations from foundations, individual donors, churches and corporations.
